Architecture

The history of architecture traces the changes in architecture through various traditions, regions, overarching stylistic trends, and dates. The beginnings of all these traditions are thought to be humans satisfying the very basic need of shelter and protection. The term "architecture" generally refers to buildings, but in its essence is much broader, including fields we now consider specialised forms of practice, such as urbanism, civil engineering, naval, military, and landscape architecture.



Trends in architecture were influenced, among other factors, by technological innovations,

particularly in the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries. The improvement and/or use of steel, cast iron, tile, reinforced concrete, and glass helped for example Art Nouveau appear and made Beaux Arts more grandiose.

Ian Murphy

lan Murphy works in a variety of drawing, printing and painting techniques to produce large bold canvasses. The character and eroded architecture of Venice has been the inspiration for much of his work. He experiments with collage to create a textured base for his detailed pen and ink work. The colours and mark making used within his work creates a very sad and gloomy effect.

The emotion in his work makes you wonder who, if anybody, lives in the buildings he draws. Look closely to see the different materials and techniques used within the artwork. What would happen if you changed the colours used? Would this change the emotion of the piece of work?



WEEK 7 & 8:

Many viewers of lan Murphy's work often talk about wanting to 'walk in' to the painting, trying to follow an enticing journey through to the inner courtyard or through a partially obscured passageway. This visual connection is usually associated with the presence of a hidden light source, an important ingredient which gently manipulates the audience into engaging, not only with his personal exploration of places far away, but the unique traits of the image itself.

The 'Hutong' series, in particular, encapsulates this quality perfectly. In many of the compositions Ian Murphy presents you with the strong presence of the exterior facades of the Chinese village homes. The walls physically occupy the greater proportion of the canvas surface, they seamlessly appear out of the tactile surface textures, but significantly they are always depicted from an angle that prevents you from seeing too much of the interior space. This almost tantalising approach to the viewing angle, in one sense, immediately symbolises the protective nature of the exterior facade but, more importantly, it creates intrigue and speculation; what is there to see through the passageway? What will I discover if I walk a bit further?

Monoprinting

Monoprinting is the process of making a print using 'mark making'.

Mark making is any mark made using any material on any surface, such as:

- pencil on paper
- photoshop brush mark on a screen
- scratch in clay
- paint on a canvas

A mark can be a line, a dot, a scratch, a curve, a thumbprint and so on. Using different tools can help create different thicknesses and types of marks.

The colour used to create monoprints is usually water-based ink. A roller is used to apply the ink evenly over the printing sheet. This is usually an acrylic sheet or other washable flat surfaces.

Lucy Jones

Living and working in Edinburgh's New Town, Lucy Jones' work is mainly inspired by the surrounding Georgian architecture.

"Experimenting with different materials and techniques, I'm always looking for new and surprising effects and combinations. I follow no rules regarding materials or mediums - mixing and layering pastels, acrylics, inks, watercolour, crayon and printing ink - drawing with pencil, stick or brush - whatever the composition needs next. A collector of old books and maps, wherever possible, I use relevant texts and images, to create 'building portraits', which have a literary as well as visual story. Adding a layer of hot wax to give transparency to the finished piece adds a final element of surprise and chance — I never know which layers or details are going to be revealed, which piece is a disappointment or joy."
